

Report on the UCF-AUC Exchange Program Fall 2024

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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

In May 2018, the University of Central Florida established a reciprocal exchange program with the American University in Cairo. This partnership with AUC offers students from both institutions the unique opportunity to gain a deeper understanding of each other's cultures. By exploring their differences, they discover commonalities that bring people closer together.

The UCF students participating in the exchange program at AUC are supported by their benefactors, Jonathan and Nancy Wolf. The Wolfs' generosity in sponsoring UCF students to study at AUC has been instrumental in creating scholarships that help offset the costs of housing, board, and incidental expenses. As UCF donors, the Wolfs have enabled UCF students in Business, Political Science, Engineering, and other disciplines to broaden their academic perspectives through this program.

UCF-AUC NON-STUDENT EXCHANGE

As part of the Wolf family donation, **Global Perspectives and International Initiatives (GPII)** has taken the lead in implementing a faculty exchange program with AUC which has seen numerous visits between Orlando and Cairo over the past 6 years. GPII has also worked with AUC to organize and cohost several events in Orlando, Cairo, and Washington. GPII Executive Director has led five faculty delegation visits personally, and has participated as a speaker at several AUC-UCF events – including on American foreign policy, the ongoing conflict in the Middle East between Israel and Hamas, U.S.-Arab relations, and the implications of U.S. politics regional and global order. GPII also has helped publish numerous articles in AUC's prestigious *Cairo Review of Global Affairs,* including providing the bulk of content for a special climate change issue that coincided with Egypt hosting the UN Climate Summit in Sharm EI Sheikh in November 2022. Dumke also taught political science at AUC as a Distinguished Visiting Professor in the Fall 2023 Semester, and currently is working with AUC's School of Global Affairs and Public Policy to establish a Conflict Transformation Program.

Jana has traveled outside of the U.S. several times, primarily to Europe. She chose the American Cairo program because she met another AUC exchange student, Fatma Abousree (Fall 2022), in one of her classes at UCF in Fall 2022. Fatma had mentioned that there were many international students at AUC and that the campus was very welcoming. Jana formed a friendship with Fatma and other AUC students who came in subsequent semesters. She has continued her friendship with Fatma through the use of technology.

What surprised you the most about AUC and Egypt?

Jana received a scholarship to attend AUC. Being fluent in both Egyptian Arabic and English, she found it easy to connect with AUC students and other international students she met at orientation. She described the campus as beautiful, quiet, and walkable, and she admired its architecture. As part of her experience, she walked around the campus so frequently that one of the RAs suggested she organize a walking event.

Although Jana had visited Egypt before due to her Egyptian heritage, she wanted this experience as a student to see Egypt from a new perspective. She was eager to live on campus and experience camaraderie with other students. She loved the cultural experience of being in Cairo. While the campus was very quiet, stepping outside into the bustling activity of the city was an adrenaline rush. It felt as though Cairo never slept, with its vibrant nightlife.

What was your most enjoyable experience?

The most enjoyable experience for Jana was making new friendships. The experience differed greatly from her quieter life in America. Cairo's active environment offered many opportunities to engage with the country and its people through food, language, and music. Jana also had meaningful moments connecting with her parents and their Egyptian heritage. Visiting Egypt provided her the opportunity to strengthen those connections. Her UCF cohort's experience at AUC was also very positive.

How did you find the teaching style at AUC?

Jana found that classes at AUC were predominantly based on group projects, emphasizing collaboration with a diverse range of people. In contrast, her courses at UCF focused more on quizzes and exams. At AUC, she felt compelled to engage with others more actively. Her instructor, Dr. Jasmin Fouad, Associate Professor of Economics and Finance, made her classes enjoyable and memorable. The faculty was engaging and encouraging, leaving a lasting impression on Jana. She plans to work in Human Resources in the future, and this study abroad experience provided her with valuable exposure to students from various backgrounds.

Can you tell us a bit about yourself and what led you to apply for a scholarship to study abroad in Egypt?

Can you identify any specific moments or experiences in Egypt that catalyzed a significant change in your outlook on life?

I am a firm believer in people-to-people initiatives and cultural exchanges and think that we all only benefit from interacting with and learning from others, whether it be a neighbor or someone from the other side of the planet. Oftentimes I found myself in settings with students from all over the world- countries like Albania, Yemen, Germany, Turkey, Nigeria, Denmark, USA, and of course, Egypt. These experiences with such diverse groups only increased my belief in worldwide connection.

Tell us a bit about yourself and what led you to apply for a scholarship to study abroad in Egypt.

I am a first-generation college student majoring in Business Administration with a focus on accounting. I have a strong interest in working and living abroad after graduation, which motivated me to pursue a minor in International Business, knowing that gaining international credits would be essential to achieving that goal. After experiencing a faculty-led study abroad trip to Singapore, I was inspired to take on a full semester abroad. I chose Egypt because it was a new and exciting destination that stood out for its unique position as a cross-section between Africa and the Middle East, offering rich cultural diversity. It felt like the perfect place to immerse myself in a new culture while expanding my academic horizons. However, as a low-income student receiving financial aid, I needed extra financial support to make this dream a reality. When I discovered that the opportunity came with a scholarship, I was convinced that I could make it happen, solidifying my decision to go.

In what ways do you feel you have grown personally and professionally during your time at AUC and in Egypt?

Personally, my time in Egypt pushed me to step outside my comfort zone, where I gained independence and confidence in navigating a completely different cultural environment. Being immersed in a new culture required me to adapt quickly and make decisions independently, which strengthened my sense of self-reliance. I learned to embrace uncertainty and take initiative, whether it was exploring the vibrant streets of Cairo or engaging in conversations with locals. This experience not only deepened my appreciation for diverse perspectives but also helped me cultivate resilience in the face of challenges. The friendships I formed with local and international students enriched my understanding of community and connection, making me more open-minded and adaptable.

Professionally, I honed my communication skills by interacting with people from diverse backgrounds and ideologies. I also learned to be more flexible, adapting to the local pace of life and living on "Egyptian time", which often meant working later hours than I was used to as an American. Can you identify any specific moments or experiences in Egypt that catalyzed a significant change in your outlook on life?

I vividly remember a moment in Sharm el-Sheikh when I saw a man selflessly distributing dates to everyone in the street before iftar. This simple act of kindness encapsulated the communal spirit and dedication to tradition that characterized the month. It felt as though I had stepped into a different world, one where compassion and human connection were of the greatest importance.

This sense of community was further amplified during my time dining in the common room at AUC with both local and international students. As the sun set and the time for iftar approached, the atmosphere in the room would buzz with excitement and anticipation. The meals were always a vibrant array of traditional dishes, from fragrant rice and savory stews to sweet desserts and refreshing drinks. Gathering around the table, I felt a palpable sense of connection, not only to the food but to the diverse group of people around me. This exchange deepened my understanding of Ramadan and its importance in Egyptian culture, emphasizing the values of hospitality and generosity. I witnessed how the act of sharing food became a powerful symbol of unity, transcending individual differences and fostering a sense of belonging.

How has studying in Egypt and AUC influenced your understanding of global issues or cultural dynamics?
